HATTER. Not the same at all. You might just as well say, 'I see what I eat' is the same thing as 'I eat what I see.'

MARCH HARE. You might just as well say, 'I like what I get; is the same thing as "I get what I like." ¿Verdad?

DOORMOUSE. You might just as well say that "I breathe when I sleep" is the same thing is as "I sleep when I breathe."

ALICIA. (To audience:) La verdad is I don't know much about purses or bananas.

(As ALICIA reaches for the Desserts, they move.)

ALICIA. ¡Qué sabroso! Those desserts look good.

HATTER. Some things are just beyond your reach. What date is it?

ALICIA. The fourth.

(The Bread walks by.)

HATTER. (To MARCH HARE:) I told you bread wouldn't like the butter!

MARCH HARE. It's the best mantequilla, ese.

HATTER. You've put Mr. Bread in a bad mood, little girl.

ALICIA. Bread doesn't have moods.

HATTER. Anything that can be buttered on two sides has moods.

ALICIA. Like two names?

HATTER. (To ALICIA:) Have you guessed the riddle yet?

ALICIA. The riddle of me, you mean? How I can be two people at once?

HATTER. The purse and the banana.

ALICIA. I give up. Díme.

HATTER. I haven't the slightest idea of the answer.

MARCH HARE. Ni yo.
